How will I be assessed? Exam Board: AQA Specification: 8658

Throughout Year 10, you will complete a range of shorter assessments in Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing. These will take place in lesson time to build your confidence and skills when answering each of the different question types.

At the end of Year 10, you will complete a full mock exam paper under exam conditions in all four skills.

There is no coursework element to French GCSE; all skills are tested in exams at the end of Year 11 in Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing which are each worth 25% of your total grade. You will not have access to a dictionary in the exam. This means that you must revise all content and grammar regularly, not just the topic you are currently studying.

How will I be taught?

GCSE French is taught by highly experienced teachers who are enthusiastic about and committed to language learning. You will be supported and challenged in your studies through a variety of activities, including pair and group work where appropriate. In turn, you are expected to learn vocabulary regularly and develop an understanding of the grammar we cover in lessons by learning independently at home. It is impossible to 'cram' for languages exams, so we expect you to spend at least 5-10 minutes per day at home on your language skills. We also run Language Clinic every lunchtime in A121 where you can get extra help with any aspect of your French studies.
