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During the lockdown a large number of organisations are publishing resources which will help students to develop their career plans during a period when they have the time to do this research.

Here are two examples from careers hubs:



The Tees Valley hub have collated a treasure trove of virtual tours, virtual careers events guides, links to the curriculum etc. here and The Cornwall and Isles of Scilly hub has produced a publication called '10 ways to achieve careers education at home.'

The Wow Show is an award winning careers provider. Its comprehensive offer includes an online magazine style show which provides engaging insights into all kinds of aspects of the world of work and includes talks by employers/apprentices etc.



The Careers and Enterprise company has sent a very informative weekly newsletter to all careers leaders containing lots of useful links including opportunities for free online training on the Gatsby benchmarks. A number of informative reports have been published recently

A blog by **Professor Tristram** Hooley describes the likely rise in youth unemployment following the pandemic as a 'ticking timebomb'. One of several recommendations to protect young people from entering a labour market too early is about encouraging them to remain in education/ training for longer. The article provides food for thought about Year 11-12 transition programmes and guidance to any Year 12 students who are thinking of leaving at the end of this academic year.

The Resolution Foundation has published a report on the ways of tackling the expected significant rise in youth unemployment for 18-24 year olds. The findings underline the importance of incentives to encourage students to stay in education for longer, providing access to labour market information and personal guidance. This highlights the need for a strong careers strategy at school and college level. The report also highlights the importance of basic numeracy and literacy skills.

The British Academy has published this report about the quantifiable benefits of studying the arts, humanities and social sciences. It describes in detail the very high levels of employment achieved by graduates of these disciplines, the flexibility they have to change sector and role in their later lives and the skills they have that employers value. The evidence challenges the misconception that STEM students are more likely to get a job.

This report on the findings of the Future Skills questionnaire completed by more than 2900 young people analyses the impact of careers programmes and the evidence that employer encounters, workplace experiences and personal guidance are most strongly associated with improvements in resilience, academic motivation, career planning, awareness of options after school and presentation skills. It will be a useful aid to curriculum planning.
